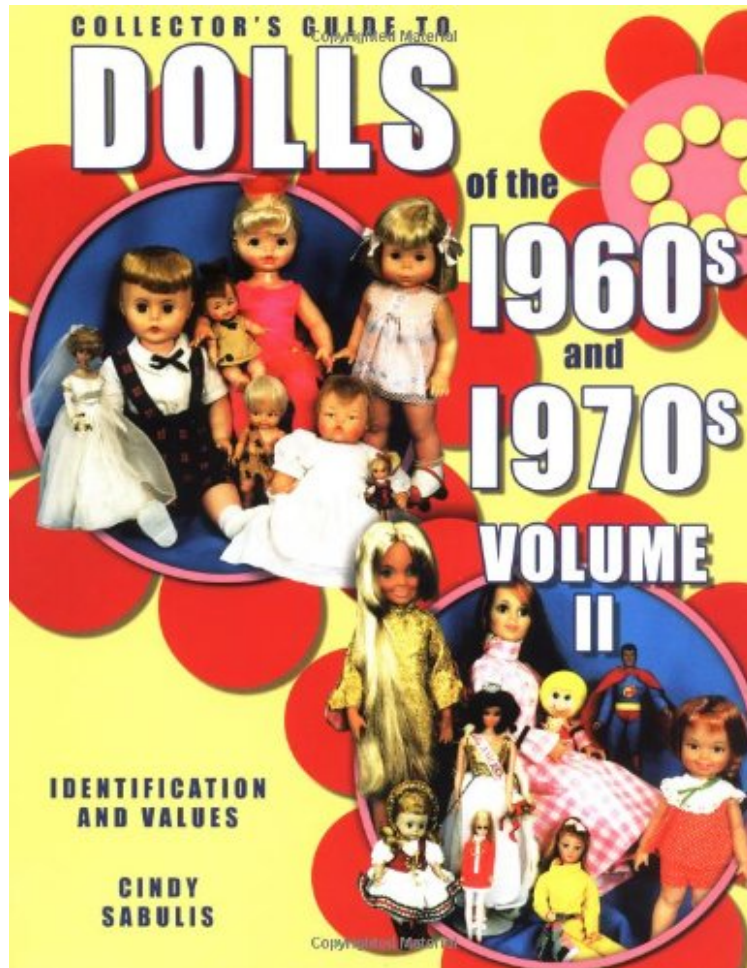

I was under the impression that the talking dolls were more represented in this volume, but they were barely touched upon. For instance, one of the the talking dolls I had as a child, Baby Secret, was pictured in an advertisement, but wasn't even commented on! I also find it curious that the author mentioned the Mego Action figures, but did not touch upon the Ideal Captain Action Figures which were of the same time-period. Perhaps the first volume (which I do not have) mentioned them?I agree with the

reviewer that said one particular doll seemed to have taken up more of the book than any other, and I felt that one page would have been sufficient. Maybe the author spent so much time on this doll because she happened to like them more? This doll book has all-new photographs and no repeats from the first volume. Well-known dolls featured include Barbie, Blythe, Sears exclusive Mini Martians, Thumbelina, Liddle Kiddles, Tressy, Tammy, Peteena, celebrity dolls, pull-string talking dolls, battery-operated walking dolls, and many more. Dolls from all the major toy companies are covered - Madame Alexander, Deluxe Reading, Hasbro, Horsman, Ideal, Kenner, Mattel, Remco, Shindana, Uneeda, and Vogue. Like the first book, the dolls are grouped according to manufacturer for easy identification. 2004 values.
