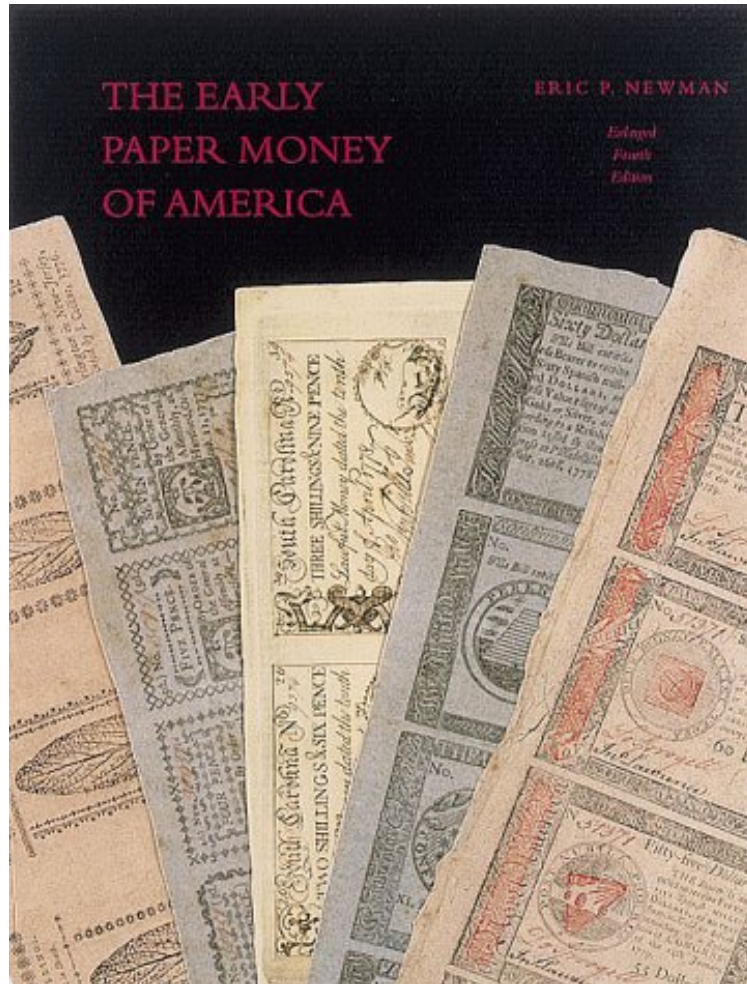

You don't need a new book every few years.As expected for a 495 page reference book you get a lot for your money. There are plenty of fact presentations, pictures, and price lists. As with all books with price lists the prices are out of date before the book is distributed. Better current prices can be found by referring to current auctions at Heritage, Teletrade, Lyn Knight, Stack Bowers et al. That way you won't overpay for a note at your local store front or on line simply because it is called "rare" or "scarce".Just knowing that punch canceled Massachusetts notes are ten percent of the value of uncanceled notes is worth the \$15 price. First, the people, places and activities of those who created the first American paper money is inextricably woven into the history of the United States. Second, the artistic and aesthetic aspects of this money are intrinsically wonderful and fascinating. The fact that much research remains to be done with respect to the technical aspects of production, as well as the design elements, both major and minute, creates a need for ongoing research. Third, this volume is indispensable to an appreciation of American numismatics and to anyone who collects or invests in American money of any kind. An argument can be made that our earliest paper money is even more fascinating than American coinage, since it predates coinage and is much less studied.
