This monumental volume is a must-have for ancient Roman coin collectors. While not as comprehensive as the 10 volume Roman Imperial Coinage, it distills the most pertinent information that most collectors are looking for into one volume. It provides references to the RIC and other major catalogs of Roman coins. If this weren't enough it features color photos of all obverse and reverse types for a given emperor. Brief articles interspersed throughout the volume provide background information on Roman culture and history to give context to the coinage. The market analysis for the coinage of each ruler was especially informative, and I really like how the author acknowledges eBay as a major factor in the market. The book is printed beautifully and justifies the use of art paper by use of colour-coded sections and crystal-clear colour photographs of coins. Despite its bulk, I have found the volume comfortable to use. The contents are very well organized and errata available as a free PDF on the author's website. Being a novice in this area of collecting, I have

written to the author on a few occasions requesting his opinion and have always received kind, prompt, and helpful advice. I have all volumes of RIC and Sear's books (including the two volumes on Byzantine coinage) that cost me many, many times more than this one. On a few occasions, I have even found types missing in Sear's catalogs in ERIC II. The author is to be commended for creating a single-volume work at such an affordable price. The release of ERIC II follows five years of intensive work in going well beyond the scope of the first edition. Where 2005's ERIC provided a solid introduction into the field of Roman coinage this followup aims for a much higher ambition with a fully comprehensive catalog of even the most obscure issues while maintaining the user-friendly format of the original. Also retained and significantly enhanced is the use of high-resolution color photography from cover to cover. The plates for each ruler have been upgraded with better and more photos with the rest of each section making rich use of color elsewhere. The listings are now more informative and are internally referenced with pertinent ancillary data. A significant improvement has been made in extending the catalog over the entire Byzantine series thus covering the complete span of coinage from the days of Augustus through the downfall of Constantine XI some 1,500 years later. Numbering some 60,000 entries, this landmark work marks the first occasion such a wide swath of numismatics has been covered in a single volume. It is a fundamental revision and scope expansion, including 60,000 entries that incorporate essential numismatic esoterica. The foremost subject resource since H. Cohen's eight-volume *Description historique des monnaies frappées sous l'Empire Romain* of 1880-1892, ERIC II covers the 1500-year period between Augustus and the 1453 fall of Constantinople. Opening with an informative introduction that explains denominations and mint marks, Suarez (ERIC I) divides his subject into 15 chronologically organized chapters, surveying the ruling culture and detailing each imperial coin's minted permutations.
