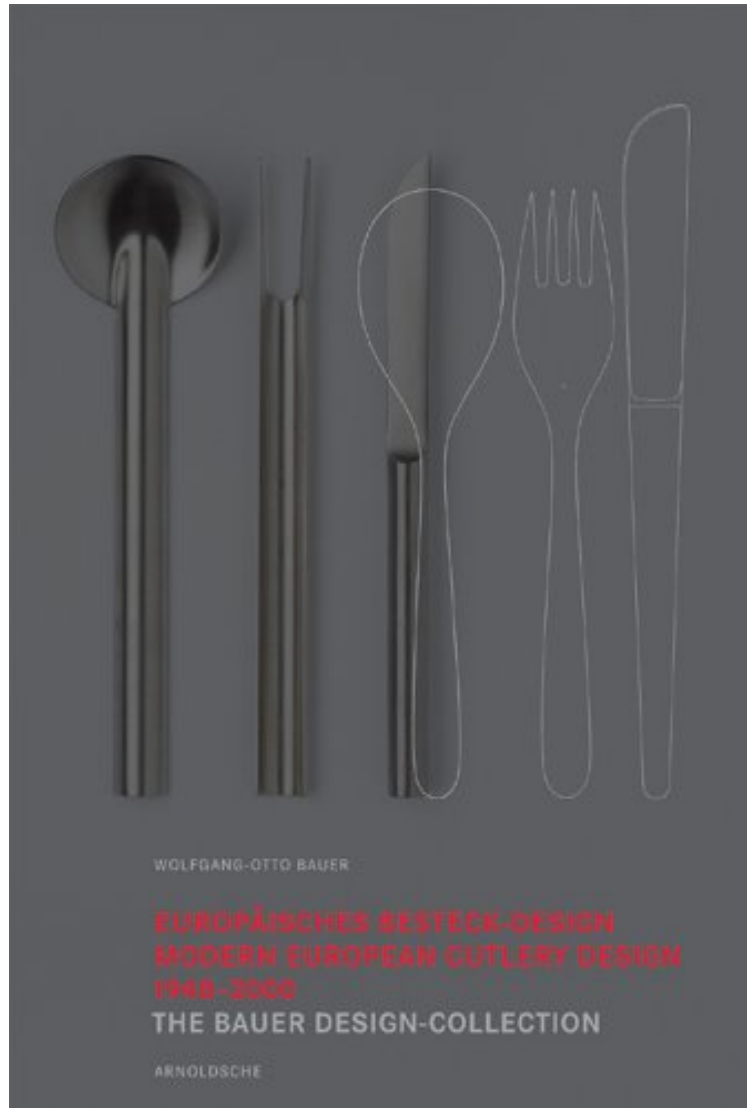

After WWII, stainless steel (also known by the abbreviation 18/8) was the working material preferred by cutlery designers. Table culture attained a high profile with this new material. The industrialists Hugo Pott, W. Seibel and Philipp Rosenthal played a paramount role in ensuring that it did. The Bauer Design Collection boasts fascinating examples revealing bold approaches to form, a supreme achievement in high-gloss steel, innovative, tactile cutlery that is also provocative alongside modern design classics. Fifty years of German cutlery design by such luminaries as W. Wagenfeld, C. Pott, W. Karnagel, P. Raacke and T. Wirkkala form the nucleus of the collection. About the Author Wolfgang-Otto Bauer (born in Memmingen in 1931) began to collect stainless steel cutlery in the mid-1950s. After graduating in mechanical engineering from TH Stuttgart, he worked as a design engineer and designer for large firms such as Motometer and Robert Bosch GmbH. On the side, he worked as a designer in film and a graphic designer while also lecturing in the history of industrial design. A member of the Association of German Industrial Designers (VDID) and the Deutsche Werkbund Baden-Württemberg, Wolfgang-Otto Bauer has presented objects, cutlery and table ware at numerous exhibitions and in publications since 1983.
